We moved to Siguatepeque:



Being experienced at moving-5 times in 3 years-we started packing early. On the 20th of July at 7:00 am our BMDMI truck arrived with 3 men to help us move. We were a little disappointed to discover that the truck would not fit under the security gate but we were grateful for the big guys who would help us carry our stuff ½ a block to the truck. God was good to us and the move went well. We arrived at our house at about 4:00 pm. Nothing was broken!





Our Storage Challenge

Our house is small but the rent is less than 1/2 what we paid in Tegucigalpa. The funds that we save will help make up for some of the money needed to do ministry. Upon unpacking we realized that we had no place to store ministry supplies let alone our own things. Our house was jam-packed with no significant storage areas.



We needed a shed. This was not an expense we had planned but the need was real.. Our best & cheapest option was to connect our house and its surrounding security wall making a storage room. Problem solved.



Our Water Problem

Many cities in Honduras have a water quantity problem. This is somewhat strange when you realize that currently we are in middle of rainy season. We receive water from the city two to three times a week. It is never enough to refill our cistern. Within 2 weeks of arriving

we were out of water.

Our family learns to be more flexible. When it downpours we catch the rainwater in buckets from our roof and pour it in our pila. This seems to balance out our consumption. We use the rainwater to wash clothing and mop the floors.
